At last year's School Games we asked for your feedback. 95% of people rated the COMPETITIONS as good or very good; 92% rated the CULTURAL ASPECTS as good or very good. This is a fantastic

response and we are very proud of what was achieved. All parts of the day were rated overwhelmingly positively: Pre-Event 76%, opening CEremony 70% and VENUES 88%. We were also offered suggestions as to how the event could be improved, here are our responses to your feedback

THEY'S SHOULD BE A PENGUIN MASCOT. A MEERKAT MASCOT. MOVE MASCOTS.

Our mascots were designed by pupils in each of the 6 areas of Northumberland. Each represents qualities, or features of it's area. The hard working pit pony from Blyth & Bedlington; a quick -witted shark from Cramlington & Seaton Valley; Tyney the friendly sheep representing Tynedale; from North Northumberland a fearless pheasant; Ponpeth the skilful squirrel representing Morpeth & Ponteland, and Amblington the determined dolphin from Ashington & Coquet. The mascots are hugely popular at the Games, and inject a real sense of fun and excitement. The volunteers wearing the suits, suffer the heat and weight, but it is still one of the most popular jobs. So, whilst it would be cool to have a meerkat or a penguin, we don't want to take any attention away from the 6 fantastic mascots we already have.

THE OPENING CEPEMONY SHOULD BE SHOPTER.

We understand that when you arrive at the School Games you are eager to get playing, and we don't want to keep you waiting too long. However it is also really important that this is a special event, different to your normal school fixtures. The opening ceremony is a celebration of your success! Last year, competitors did arrive very early and there was a bit of waiting around before the ceremony began. To make things better, we will be delaying the arrival times and also putting some interactive entertainment in the registration period. We will also spice up the ceremony, so that it is even more exciting and engaging. Craig Heap from BBCs "Tumble" will be on hand to liven things up! We need better trained umpires and referees.

It's really important to us that the standard of competition at the Northumberland School Games is high, and that requires high quality officials. The School Games must be an opportunity not just for competitors, but also for young people to take on leadership and volunteering roles. Wherever possible we want to use pupils as referees and umpires. To improve their skills and make sure they are ready for the Northumberland School Games, this year we have identified which schools will be providing officials earlier. We have asked what training they need and worked with the National Governing Bodies to provide this. We have also asked that all officials have had more practice at using their skills, at level 1 and level 2 competitions. All of our officials work hard to apply the rules of the competitions but also keep the games flowing, and we hope that competitors, managers and spectators will recognise how difficult their job can be and respect their decisions.

ENTY DUCING GOALBALL

Over 60 young people came to Concordia in November to spend a day honing their inclusive leadership skills. Working with Paralympian Craig McCann, they looked at what skills a leader needs, what they are good at and then playing and coaching the inclusive game of Goalball. Goallball will be a brand new competition at the Northumberland 2015 School Games in June. The competition will be for mixed Year 6 teams from both mainstream and special schools. It's a



fast moving game in which all players are blindfolded and so have to listen for the sound of the moving ball (which has a bell in it). The leaders who were part of our conference will be contacting schools who have Year 6 pupils to offer free taster sessions and your School Games Organiser will be organising a Level 2 qualifying competition prior to the Games.
